


Drama and Music Performances:

English Speaking Union Success for AGS! by Ms Halaka, Curriculum Leader for English

I was delighted to attend the ESU Evelyn Wrench Lecture and Dinner with quest of honour The Rt Hon. the Lord Patten of Barnes KG CH, on behalf of AGS as a finalist in the ESU Oracy Culture Award on Tuesday 8th October. Not only was this a fantastic event, with an inspiring lecture from Lord Patten on 'Free Speech', but it was also an absolute honour (and a lovely surprise!) to be awarded Runner-up in the ESU Oracy Culture Award 2024. The ESU judges were particularly impressed by our Public Speaking Competition for Year 7 and Year 8 students, now in its third year, our Debatina Society, now open to Year 10 upwards, and our approach to developing Oracy and Expressive Communication in English lessons across the age range.

Lord Patten spoke about the value of free speech, exploring ideas about the importance of expressing viewpoints with passion and conviction - and without relying on notes - and the challenging but vital skill of thinking critically and expressing your thoughts clearly. He also discussed grappling with views that you disagree with and even are enraged by (he joked about the ability of the newspapers to irritate and enrage him every single day), and the need to remember that it is totally acceptable to disagree with each other, but that we need to disagree agreeably! However, he warned against the worrying use of communication to incite hatred and harm, citina the recent riots in the UK and the concerning use of hate speech to move others to violence. He linked these ideas back to the spread of hatred in Europe during the 1930s and the fear felt by those who were - and still are - targeted and persecuted under totalitarian regimes. He said it was important to fight for your values (such as free speech) but even more important to live up to your values. He ended on a hopeful note of optimism, reminding us that, on the whole, our society is a force for good and our commitment to education, particularly oracy as a fundamental part of education, is the way to ensure society continues to function effectively.

As you'll be aware, Oracy and Expressive Communication are fundamental to our school community here at AGS. You'll no doubt have heard on the news recently that there is a shift to recognising the importance of oracy in education. In fact, just earlier this week there was a report published by the Oracy Education Commission calling for oracy to be given equal status to reading, writing, and arithmetic. At AGS, we have long believed in the power of effective communication - not just to enable our students to be successful in their studies, but to give them the confidence to navigate the complex and sometimes confusing world in which we live. We know that students who can express themselves effectively and confidently tend to be more engaged with their education and the world around them. We want every single student at AGS to be a confident communicator: in lessons, around school, and as members of their local and wider communities, and we are committed to supporting them on this journey, allowing them to flourish and to find the joy in their educational experiences. In a world of robots and AI, we want our students to be happy human beings capable of critical thinking, clear and convincing expression, and emotional connection, living meaningful lives.

Oracy is linked directly to all of our AGS student virtues: the way in which we speak and communicate allows us to show respect and compassion; we all have to be responsible communicators who are committed to improving the way in which we speak and communicate; we need to be curious when listening and attending to others and often courageous - it isn't always easy to speak up or share what you're thinking this requires a certain vulnerablity and a willingness to move beyond our comfort zones; so much of oracy and expressive communication is about putting yourself out there, being ambitious for ourselves and each other, and having a belief in ourselves - and in each other. Finally, speaking up and communicating is a sure-fire way of showing that we are proud to be students - and teachers - at AGS; it was such an honour to represent our amazing community at the ESU event, and I could not be prouder of our students and staff for all the wonderful work they do each day.

Supporting oracy and expressive communication at home

Please do communicate regularly and mindfully with your children - encourage them to speak and communicate with confidence and at length, to make eye contact with you and to use their body language to support their message. You could ask them to tell you about their current favourite TV programme or game, or ask them to explain something they learnt in a lesson that day, or you could watch or read something together and then let your child tell you their ideas about what you've just experienced together. Give them your full attention when you listen to them and you will see what wonderful things they are capable of communicating to you.

Dropping off and collecting students at the end of the day

If you are dropping off or collecting children by car at the beginning and end of the day, please be considerate to pedestrians and other road users.

The Talbot Avenue entrance is a pedestrian entrance for students and is very busy before and after school.

We are concerned that there will be a serious accident, due to dangerous driving and parking, and ask parents and carers to be more careful.

Please do not stop outside school on Talbot Avenue to drop off or pick up children. This poses a risk to both drivers and pedestrians.

The Turning Circle, accessible from Lidgett Lane, is there for parents and carers to drop off and pick up children.

Alternatively, you can arrange to collect children from nearby streets.

Students will be reminded in school about road safety, and the importance of checking for traffic before crossing a road. Please talk to your children about road safety, particularly if they are walking to school by themselves for the first time.

The safety of our students is our priority, and we must ensure they are able to always enter and exit the school site safely.

Access to the School Site

Morning:

Talbot Avenue - The gates open at 8.10 am and close at 8.40 am. Students arriving late will need to press the Student button at the gate to be let through to the Student Entrance/ Attendance Office.

Lidgett Lane - The gates will open at 8.15 am and close at 8.25 am. Students arriving late will need to enter school via Talbot Avenue. All cars must leave the Turning Circle area by 8.25 am.

Afternoon:


Talbot Avenue - The gates open at 3.00 pm and close at 3.30 pm.

Lidgett Lane - The gates to the Turning Circle open at 2.40 pm and will be locked at 3.30 pm. All cars must leave this area by 3.30 pm, when the gates will be locked.

Students staying in school for after school activities will be supervised by staff and taken to the gate to leave safely via Talbot Avenue.

Don't start your day by being late to school! Students need to be in school, in their form room, at 8.25 am ready for the register to be taken at 8.30 am.

SCHOOL DAY 2024-25



All students should leave the school site by 3.10pm unless attending a session 7 or working with a member of staff. There is to be no waiting in the cafe after school. The only students in the building must be involved in Enrichment sessions, a session 7, or isolation/detention.
