End of Term Message from Barbara Trayer, Chair of the Board of Governors

As we approach the end of the Autumn Term, the Governors would like to share some examples of the involvement that we have had with the school during this term other than attend the Full Governing Body, Strategy and Resources, Personal Development/Behaviour/Attendance and Quality of Education meetings.

All Governors have completed the Prevent Training course to ensure that we are all fully compliant during our frequent visits and meetings in school.

Dan Carver, Jo Travis and I met with the school's LEA improvement advisor to review the Headteacher's performance management for 2023/24. As Mr Roper will be retiring at the end of this academic year, it was agreed that both Mr Roper and Mr Norrington, as the Associate Headteacher, have similar targets. This was a very informative, productive, and positive meeting which will continue to provide opportunities for the school to further develop and meet the vision of becoming 'Outstanding'.

I was privileged and overwhelmed to experience another wonderful Culture Day which was organised by the Student Leadership Team. The outfits, music and stalls of products that were available were a credit to the entire school community. Anna Lees and I, along with many representatives from the business community spent a morning interviewing some Year 11 students in preparation for their progression into Post 16 options where their maturity and confidence was outstanding. Joanne Travis attended the World of Music Concert on 12 December who reported that the show was 'Brilliant'!

In addition to my weekly meetings with Mr Norrington and Mr Roper and Governing Board meetings, I have met with the Safeguarding Team, Director of KS4/5, Deputy Headteacher Quality of Education, Early Careers Teacher Lead and Curriculum Leader for Maths all of which have been extremely positive and showcases the fantastic work that is taking place at Allerton Grange School to ensure that every student can maximise their potential as well as being aspirational. Dan Carver has met with Patrick Fletcher, Finance Manager. All these meetings have been extremely positive which have showcased the superb work that is taking place as well as the priorities for the Spring and Summer Terms.

This has also been a very busy term in the planning for, shortlisting and appointment of the new Headteacher for September 2025. The interviews took place on 20 and 21 November where we invited 3 candidates (2 external and 1 internal) to meet with a group of governors and 4 education consultants who were supported by Natalie Watson, HR Manager. We are delighted to inform you that the successful candidate, after a robust process, is Andy Norrington. We are looking forward to working with Andy who will be able to build upon the growth and success of Allerton Grange School, supported by the outstanding Senior Leadership/Middle Leader Teams and all staff. We believe he is well placed to take the school to the next stage of its growth and development.

The update regarding academisation is as follows: the 2030 deadline for all schools to either have become or in the process of becoming an academy is no longer the case. The Labour Government have retracted some of the previous support/actions in that an individual school can no longer apply to become a standalone academy, the funding given to state schools to convert to academy status has been withdrawn and that small trusts must merge or be taken over by another or larger trust. Based upon this information, the Governing Body would like to confirm that Allerton Grange will continue to be part of the LEA for the foreseeable future. However, at the same time, we will ensure that we are monitoring the latest information from the Department for Education and will review our position as and when necessary to ensure that we have the best possible support for the ongoing development of AGS.

The fantastic work that is carried out by the Attendance Team has been acknowledged and rewarded externally in that Allerton Grange is in the top 25% of all schools nationally and in the top 10% of schools that are similar in cohorts of students. This is a most wonderful achievement and confirms how the students who are privileged to be educated at the school enjoy, succeed, feel safe and thrive here.

The Governors have been invited to the end of term staff Star Awards presentations which is fantastic to see the surprises on colleagues faces when they find out that they have been chosen – a fabulous way to finish 2024!

Online Safety

Leeds Safeguarding Children Partnership, West Yorkshire Police and partners have launched a campaign to encourage parents to have conversations with their children about their online activity.

The online world can be a great place for young people, when enjoyed safely, but some criminals can use online games and social media to contact and exploit them.

The campaign "**Start the conversation**" encourages parents to have conversations with their children, to understand who they are talking to and interacting with online.

Talking to a child about what they do online, is as important as asking them where they are going when they go out with their friends.

Regular conversations about their online world could encourage children to talk to a trusted adult if something they have seen online made them feel uncomfortable or if someone is talking to them that they don't know.

For parents and carers:

Talk to your child about staying safe online

Most of us tend to think of our online and offline lives as separate, but children today are growing up with technology and the internet as a natural part of their lives. To them there isn't a separation. It's all just life. The internet is now part of the real world.

Talking to your child about what they do online is just as important as asking where they are going when they go out with their friends. It can be difficult starting the conversation with your child about their online activities. Technology keeps changing and you might find it overwhelming trying to keep up with it all, but you don't need to. You just need to take an interest in what apps and games your child is using. That's the best place to start.


Your child might not want to share anything with you at first, but keep trying.

Having honest and open conversations with your child and speaking to them regularly about what they are doing online, could be crucial in giving your child the confidence to tell you if they have seen something that makes them feel uncomfortable or may highlight someone who is wanting to cause harm.
