After lots of hard work, we are delighted that our Year 13 students are receiving offers for university places.



This includes four offers for places at the University of Cambridge and one offer for the University of Oxford, as well as other offers to study at Durham University, University of Leeds, University of York, University of Manchester, University of Bristol, University of Edinburgh, Lancaster University, University of Plymouth, University of Exeter and Newcastle University.

Our Aim High group is supported through the rigorous application process, through seminars, help with application forms and practicing for interviews.

Year 13 students have also had success applying for very competitive apprenticeships, with one student receiving an offer for a Ernst and Young apprenticeship place.

We are incredibly proud of the commitment, resilience and dedication our young people haveshown in their studies and extra-curricular activities, and are applying this to their future plans for university, apprenticeships and careers.









Primary Workshop

On Tuesday and Wednesday, we had some excited Year 6 visitors from Highfield Primary in school for two Design and Technology sessions.

The children had worked on designs for musical instruments in class before coming to Allerton Grange to build their projects in the Technology workshops.

Mrs Hawkins (Curriculum Leader of Technology) demonstrated a range of techniques for the children to make drums, handbells, rainsticks and xylophones. They were incredibly focused and worked carefully using tools to make their instruments, as well as problem-solving and developing new skills.


WIRED online resource for girls, women and minority gender young people aged 11-25 years
